

We deliver programs in Nevada communities

Our unique structure places university professionals in 18 offices in urban and rural communities throughout Nevada. Community-based and campus faculty collaborate with local leaders, volunteers and organizations to identify needs, establish priorities, design and implement research-based educational programs, and evaluate impacts. Applied research is conducted to gain new knowledge, solve practical problems and meet specific community needs.

Our practical approach to education is more than 90 years old

We are more than 90 years old but we don't feel it! Established by the Smith-Lever Act in 1914, Cooperative Extension was designed as a partnership between the federal government, land-grant universities and county governments. Today, this partnership is still intact, with additional funding provided through grants, contracts and gifts to expand program offerings. What began as "practical information on agriculture and home economics," has expanded to include other program areas as defined in the Nevada Revised Statutes.



Our major areas of program emphasis

- **Agriculture:** We enhance agricultural sustainability through livestock quality assurance, marketing, viable traditional and alternative crops, and appropriate pest and environmental management strategies.
- **Community Development:** We strengthen communities through leadership and volunteer development, economic development, public policy education, and conflict and issue resolution.
- **Health and Nutrition:** We teach about the benefits of good health associated with physical activity and nutritious food choices through the life span.
- **Horticulture:** We help homeowners resolve plant problems through diagnostics and the implementation of best management practices, and teach sound environmental management practices to professionals.
- **Human and Family Development:** We build resiliency and protective factors in youth, families and communities, creating supportive environments so youth can reach their fullest potential.
- **Natural Resources:** We educate people in the use of best management practices that protect water quality and quantity, restore and maintain rangeland health, control invasive species and resolve conflicts.
